Operation Sceptre: Knife Crime awareness week of action



Operation Sceptre (#operationsceptre) is a National Campaign to target knife related crime by raising awareness amongst communities and to encourage *everyone* to understand the risks and how you can help to reduce these offences and keep people safe.

During the Week of Action, which starts **w/c Monday 15th to Sunday 21st May 2023** or over coming weeks, your child may receive a presentation in school which highlights the risks and consequences and how they can keep themselves and others safe by reporting any concerns. There will also be advice, updates and key messages posted via the Cambridgeshire Constabulary Facebook, Twitter and Instagram pages. A key message that Cambridgeshire Constabulary will focus upon is to raise awareness on **Joint Enterprise**.

Joint Enterprise is a UK LAW that allows more than one person to be charged and convicted of a crime, irrespective of who committed it. What this means is that an individual will be considered as a guilty party of a crime that another person committed where there is sufficient evidence to prove that they were working together or that they had awareness that a crime was intended to occur.

Examples of how you could be found guilty of a violent criminal offence under Joint Enterprise are as follows:

- If you were part of a group and someone in that group harms someone with a knife or other weapon.
- If you were supporting the attacker's actions by verbal and/or physical encouragement.
- If you knew that the person who made the attack was going to start violence but you did nothing to prevent it (such as inform the police/school staff/other authorities).

Top Tips for Being Cyber Resilient



Do not click any suspicious links – this includes any from accounts you may know or recognise.



Remember to back up and update your device often.



Don't enter or give your personal information, account details or card details on login sites you are sent to via links.



Always ignore accounts representing companies, organisations or public figures who are not verified.



Report scams to the appropriate authorities.



Regularly scan your devices for viruses or malware.



Pay attention to misspellings or grammatical errors in official messages/emails – this is usually an indicator.



Never send money to anyone in order to 'receive a gift, prize or winnings'.



Create a strong password and review it regularly.



If you aren't sure or don't know the sender, don't reply.

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Nitrous Oxide Canisters: Parent and Carers awareness

We have recently covered this subject in a previous newsletter, however, sadly there is a need to highlight this issue again.

Nationally, Police forces are receiving increasing reports of the harmful effects caused from Nitrous Oxide misuse. In addition to the widely reported risks of accidents while under the influence of this gas, there are increasing hospital reports of young people with serious nerve damage that may be lasting.

Other risks include: Slowing of body and brain response, headaches and dizziness.

Nitrous Oxide is a colourless gas that is commonly found in pressurised metal cannisters and is usually inhaled using a balloon. It is often referred to as laughing gas, balloons, smart whips or NOS.

It is more dangerous inhaling directly from the canister as too much NOS can make you feel faint, lose consciousness or suffocate. It can cause spasm of the throat muscle and stop a person from breathing.

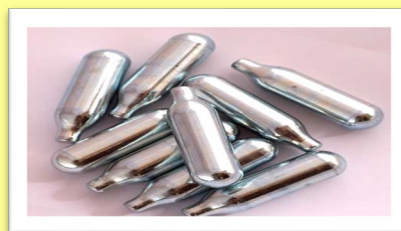

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ECOPS –Local Policing Neighbourhood Alerts

This year, Cambridgeshire Constabulary are celebrating the 20-year anniversary of eCops.

eCops began back in 2003 when an East Chesterton Sergeant wanted a way to keep local residents informed and up to date with what police were doing in their area. It started as a simple email to all East Chesterton residents and has developed and grown over the past 20 years to an advanced system used by around 19,000 people across the county.

It is free and easy to sign up, and subscribers can register according to their location and interests, reducing information overload and ensuring that they receive targeted alerts that are focused and relevant to them. Messages can include crime news, information about crime happening locally, crime prevention advice, details about local incidents and appeals for help in reducing crime in the county. Members can also reply to alerts, providing a quick and easy two-way communication between yourself and your local officers. You can tell us about your concerns to help us police your neighbourhoods effectively.

As a parent / carer to a young person in Cambridgeshire, we recommend that everyone subscribes to eCops to be more aware of crime happening in your area, therefore being in a better position to protect yourself and your family against crime.
